

PROBE PUTTER INSTRUCTIONAL CRIB SHEET

1. (Carry this “Crib Sheet” in your pocket when playing! These instructions are for right-handers; if you are left-handed, reverse the references to the “toe hash mark” and “heel hash mark”)

A. Situation: 3-foot putt that looks like it breaks 4 inches right-to-left:

*Procedure: Instead of guessing how far to the right of the hole to aim, and how hard to hit the putt, aim inside the right side of the hole and hit the ball at the hash-mark at the toe. As long as you reach the hole, the clockwise side-spin will reduce the break to 1 inch, and you will make the putt without giving up the hole.

B. Situation: 3-foot putt that looks like it breaks 4 inches left-to-right:

*Procedure: Aim inside the left side of the hole and hit the ball at the hash-mark at the heel. As long as you reach the hole, the counterclockwise side-spin will reduce the break to 1 inch, and you will make the putt without giving up the hole.

C. Situation: 6-foot putt that looks like it is straight, but may fall to the left if not hit hard enough:

*Procedure: Aim at the inside right side of the hole, but hit the ball between the hash-mark at the toe and the shaft. The slight clockwise spin on the ball will keep it from breaking left. You will make the putt without having to guess if it will break left!

D. Situation: 6-foot putt that looks like it is straight, but may fall to the right if not hit hard enough:

*Procedure: Aim at the inside left side of the hole, but hit the ball between the hash-mark at the heel and the shaft. The slight counterclockwise spin on the ball will keep it from breaking right. You make the putt without having to guess if it will break right!

E. Situation: 6-foot uphill putt that breaks left, but how much is a guess. (My three partners in a 4-man scramble tournament all had this putt, and all missed it, either hitting it too hard aimed at the right side of the hole and it did not break, or hitting it too softly, and it broke hard left. I then made it with my Probe for a birdie for our team.

*Procedure: We had time, so I told my partners to try the putt again, but to use my putter, aim the ball inside the right edge of the hole, but play the ball off the mark at the toe to put right-hand spin on the ball to keep it from breaking left. I told them to hit it hard enough to make sure they reached the hole, and they all made it! I sold three putters to them after the tournament!

Remember, longer putts will eventually take the break in the green, regardless of what spin you put on the ball. Practice placing the ball off the toe to reduce the break on short putts that would normally break to the left, and placing the ball off the heel to reduce the break in putts the would normally break to the right. All PROBE putter models (Patent Pending) have this technologically advanced feature that no other putter can imitate.

Learn to use this feature and you should reduce your number of putts by at least six putts per round!
